Oprescu" Art specializing History Institute, in iconography of Byzantine and Post-Byzantine art with a focus on the medieval Principality of Wallachia. Adrian-Silvan Ionescu (b. 1952) is Director of the "G. Oprescu" Institute of Art History and Associate Professor at the National University of Arts in Bucharest, Romania. Trained as an art historian he used to be curator at the National Museum of Art and, afterwards, at the Museum of the City of Bucharest. He eventually became the Deputy Director of the last-mentioned museum (1990-1993) before turning towards a researching and teaching career in 1995. He got his PhD in 1997. His research is focused on history of Romanian photography, 19th century fine arts and urban civilization, history of civil and military costume. He authored fifteen books and edited fifteen others. His recent publications are Regina Maria și America (Queen Marie and America) (2009), Silvan.
